RECTOR'S LETTER – THE FINAL REPORT ON THE BUILDING COMMITTEE REGARDING THE CHURCH ADDITION

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ.

If you remember back a year and then some, the Building Committee, Vestry and parishioners of All Saints' have all been responding to God's call to us to consider enlarging our church sanctuary as well as add offices. It has been a long haul getting to this point but we are now finished with the process of discerning what we would like the addition to All Saints' Church to look like, should we continue on with the project. We are now entering the stage in which a draftsperson and an engineer will take our design and bring it to a point in which we have drawings which will allow for an accurate estimate as to what this would cost should we proceed. As you know, there were still a few things that were up in the air and over the last months, the Building Committee, Vestry, and those who attended the last meeting we had, made their decisions as to what should be forwarded off to those who will complete the drawings.


To begin, the interior of the nave was still in question with several people suggesting a very thoughtful idea that the center of the sanctuary should extend beyond the transepts. This would create a traditional "cruciform" design which would give the space behind the altar some additional depth. A complicating factor in this is our septic system. The design as it stands requires us to take out two laterals in our drain field (we currently have five, each of which are 100 feet long) and so extending this portion of the sanctuary would imping upon a third lateral. The problem with all of this is that Flathead County has changed their standards and actually mandate more drain field than was required when we built. And so we knew we could go no further to the west. And, as a matter of fact, as it is, we actually have to add an additional 45 feet on a lateral to meet the capacity of 160 in the church. That left the possibility of drawing part of the west walls of windows of the two transepts back in, as it were, to create the cruciform shape. After considerable deliberation, the Building Committee and Vestry decided to keep the design as it is, believing we can incorporate some decoration inside to give the altar area a greater sense of focus. It basically came down to keeping the space we have enabling more room for a choir or worshipers.

A second major issue involved the covered outside entrance to the church. The Building Committee and Vestry have decided to have that enclosed to serve as a much larger gathering space for the church. We will then extend a roof over the approach to this new enclosed entrance so that there will still be a covered and protected handicap accessible entry way. People gathering in this larger area will allow the sanctuary to be more of a quiet space prior to services.

A third major challenge involved the selection of a flooring material. Because of advances in technology, there now is an option of a stained concrete product that requires the same thickness of wood planking. Because of the various designs that can be incorporated into such a floor, and the similarity in price, the Building

Committee and Vestry selected artistically designed concrete. If you are not familiar with this product, you may want to look at the floor in the main hallway at North Valley Hospital. Such a floor will be much cleaner than carpeting and will lend to the brighter acoustics. It is always fairly easy to dampen lively acoustics should that become a need.

The final decision we needed to make involved looking at the color scheme of the interior. We've elected to make it light, not distracting from the view of the trees through the windows, and then have the wood in the beams, pews, and chairs providing contrast. A minor adjustment was also approved and that involves the possibility of putting small air vents in the roof in the sanctuary. Older churches have employed these devices for centuries which simply allows the hot air out and, in the process, this "chimney effect" draws the cool air in through opened windows and screened doors. Basically these items are simply little dormers in the roof with a vent hatch employing a counter weight controlled by a cord.

As well, there was expressed interest in employing some solar energy panels on the roof. No action was taken on this other than to gather information. St. Stephen's Church, in West Valley, Utah, a suburb of Salt Lake City, as well as the Church of the Resurrection in Centerville, Utah, did this and given grants, rebates and the like, they nearly did it for free. Because the electricity generated, especially during the times when the place is not in use, can be "sold" back to the utility, often their electric meters actually go backwards.

Again, now everything heads to draft people and engineering. Until such a company is selected and they finish their work, we won't know the cost. Once that is known, and we evaluate our capacity for a capital funds drive, then we will have another parish meeting to decide if we want to see the project through to fruition. While it seems to always go a bit slowly, we have been carefully deliberating all this time and as such, it has been a fascinating and fruitful journey. We are fortunate that we have a problem of seating all our worshipers at once. In July we've had in excess of a hundred people on one Sunday and in the 80's or approaching that number on other Sundays. Our capacity currently is limited to 55 - 65 worshipers making this certainly a worthy discussion to have.

So stay tuned and as soon as we can, we hope to have some numbers to help us make some final decisions. Having said all the above, and thinking of the work so many have put into this discussion, I must say, it is a cheerful thing to be compelled by the Holy Spirit to always be moving forward.

I hope you enjoy the last third of Summer. Make sure you do that which you will wish you did as the snow flies in four short months. And thank you to everyone who has been a part of this process of discernment.
