


The prophet Micah is famous for tipping us off to the location of Jesus' birth. But with the benefit of hindsight and a whole bunch of Christmas songs extolling the "little town of Bethlehem," Jesus' natal city is no surprise to modern churchgoers. But to the people of ancient Israel, a savior from Bethlehem would have made absolutely no sense. Bethlehem was nowhere.

The location of your birth and upbringing has a huge effect on your life's trajectory. It determines your accent, the way that you speak. Social scientists say that our zip codes are more predictive than our genetics when it comes to health and income, and other studies have suggested that a good algorithm could accurately guess your age at death simply based on where you live. In twelve-step literature, attempting to solve a problem by relocating is derisively called a "geographical cure." Some people are from "the wrong side of the tracks," or, as is the case present-day Bethlehem, "the wrong side of the wall."

Some communities value their lifelong members--there's cultural cachet in being a "native Montanan," especially as this state grows by leaps and bounds. Personally, I've never lived in a place where the first question asked during introductions concerns how long you've lived there! It's kind of weird. So we shouldn't underestimate the present and future impact that our community of origin imparts.

A messiah born in Bethlehem, however, upends the hold that our hometowns can have on us. Whether we were born on the wrong side of the tracks, or with a silver spoon in our mouths, the place of our birth means *nothing* in the kingdom of heaven. "Do not presume to say to yourselves, "We have Abraham as our ancestor"; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham." And the same could be said of 5th generation Montanans!

No heavenly time is spent assessing your accent or who you're rooting for in the World Cup, and no divine algorithm is processing your zip code to determine whether you'll enter the pearly gates. That was certainly a revolutionary idea in an ancient world where gods had geographical jurisdictions. And in a modern world where your geography is given nearly deterministic power, it's still radical.

Carl passed away on November 2, after battling cancer for over 2 years. Among other friends and family, he left behind his loving wife Heidi, sons Caleb and Micah, and a brand new little grandson, Finn. Carl considered All Saints' his church, though many of you may not have met him, because he wasn't one who attended services very often. However, he was a steady and faithful "servant behind the scenes" at this church and before that at St. Matthews in Columbia Falls. Just a couple examples are the Canyon community dinners, where he was a dishwasher extraordinaire, and his years spent doing a weekly cleaning of our church buildings.

Carl had a quiet but deep faith, honed by growing up in an extended Polish Catholic family and being taught by Franciscan monks at Catholic Schools in Buffalo, NY. The core values and beliefs he absorbed during those early years resonated with him, so much so he even considered becoming a monk. But, as he would say with a grin, he liked girls too much. So instead, he used them as a guide for living his life. These values included the belief that we are all equally endowed with the very life of our Creator; we are all of us brothers and sisters. We are called to extend love and to respect the dignity of each individual, and affirm every person's unique worth. We should strive to live a life of selflessness, and in service to others. Though he rarely if ever spoke out loud about his beliefs, it was clear to me that he was something special, and it was what drew me to his side 36+ years ago, and kept me there. Not because he lived these values and ideals perfectly (do any of us?). But because he really took them to heart, and always, always! tried his very best.

December 19: Diapers and feminine hygiene products for North Valley Food Bank (Whitefish) and Columbia Falls Food Bank.

The office is usually "officially" closed the week between Christmas and New Year's (which this year is December 26-30), however at some point during the week Shawn will be in the office taking care of end of year financial paperwork. If you need to drop off a contribution you'd like to have credited for the 2022 tax year, please call or text her in advance, to make sure she's in the office or to arrange a time to meet her in the office.
