A LETTER FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

As we enter July, I do so with a profound awareness that I am one of the most fortunate people on earth because I have had the pleasure of being in your company these last fourteen years and nine months. Our congregation has had somewhere in the neighborhood of thirty five clergy, maybe a few more, since 1895, and I am guessing, that as the longest serving of them all, I've therefore been the luckiest who has had the honor of signing the service book Sunday after Sunday, attesting to the fact that I had the great privilege to worship with you on that particular day.


On the evening of Wednesday, June 19th, I went down memory lane with around fifty folks in Memorial Hall, following a wonderful supper and recalled times in my last 43 years since I started seminary which were pivotal for me. There have been a few occasions of trial but overwhelmingly, it just has been grace upon grace, with the love of God showing through the folks who made the parishes and dioceses in which I served, such islands of hope and good news in a world that can be harsh and difficult. And, of course, All Saints' is right up there as a church that has made not just a profound difference in the community in which we find ourselves, but in my life as well. You have climbed into my heart and have taken up a residency that is profound and permanent. And for that I am grateful beyond words.

As I was driving up to Whitefish - Columbia Falls, this morning as I write this, my thoughts turned to the first letter I wrote a congregation, that being as the new Curate at St. Mark's Cathedral in Salt Lake City, thirty-nine years ago. I undoubtedly typed it up, corrected it and then retyped it, and then handed it to the parish secretary, who typed it onto a "master" and combined with the other news of the parish, and a letter from the Dean, ran it through our mimeograph machine and it was delivered ten days later by bulk mail. Compare that with today where my thoughts reach you the second you click on the link for the letter to appear on your screen. (By the way, thanks to Jan, we have an e-letter second to none in the wider church. Many, many thanks indeed.)

Four decades ago, we used to audio tape our services to take to people not able to attend them. Now, thanks to Shawn's brilliance, sermons are posted on our website within a day or two and folks all over the country, and on a couple of occasions, across the sea, can watch them. Two years ago I did a baptism at Camp Marshall in which a godparent was patched in live, from northern Iraq, and participated in real time with video and audio clear as a bell. The way we communicate has indeed changed but even with the technological advances, what still has left the deepest impressions upon me, concerning you, has been our conversations, the handshake at the door, a pat on the back, or the hug we have exchanged.

I've always thought a lot about all those with whom I shared the day-to-day

Ministry of helping a church run. I also know that there have been times in which I was not at my best. For those moments in which I offended you or caused hurt and pain, I ask you to forgive me. Despite it being unintentional, that stuff happens in life and I sure have contributed my share over the years. Being particularly human does have its drawbacks. Thankfully the grace of God overcomes division and sends sin and division to the dustbin of history.

So, dear friends, I wish you well. I can't wait to see the construction completed. In time, I will see you around. I will never cease in my love for you. I will count this time in my life as an abundant blessing beyond description. And when your new Rector arrives, I will know him or her, as I have known myself, to be simply the luckiest priest on earth.

Delegates at the 2019 Diocesan Convention in Bozeman will have an opportunity to make a donation to United Thank Offering (UTO).

UTO supports God's mission around the world by providing funding for important projects.

In 2018, UTO funded 44 projects including loaning water tanks to provide clean water to at least 4,500 starved people in Kenya.

In Montana, UTO grants funded a new septic system for Camp Marshall nine years ago and enabled the Tri-County/Tri-Parish Woodbank to purchase equipment six years ago to cut larger quantities of wood in order to heat homes during the winter months.

The UTO ingathering for All Saints' will be on July 7th. Don't forget to bring your blue box!






A UNITED THANK OFFERING STORY WE CAN BE PROUD OF
