A LETTER FROM THE RECTOR

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

As I write this, (December 21st) we are entering our first day of winter. Brrrrrr. (Well not exactly, it is thirty degrees warmer than it was last Saturday during the last week of fall.) But here is the interesting thing. While the world out there will feel cold tomorrow, an extraordinary thing takes place: We will have four seconds more of daylight than the day before. It may not be golfing weather by Christmas, but bit by bit, we will have the ability to see more of our world in the light of day than we have been used to this dark December. In fact, around the time you read this, we will have gained somewhere in the neighborhood of nine minutes of light from the last day of Autumn. Again, its not exactly Alaska in June but we are heading in the direction of illumination.


Epiphany coincides with this. Christmas is a wonderful season, the means by which God incarnate is celebrated. The birth of our savior is nothing short of being monumentally extraordinary. However, it is the Season of Epiphany, which starts on the Feast of the Epiphany, January 6th, that ushers in disclosing or manifesting Christ to the world. What happened on that holy night, so distant and hidden from any except a few shepherds, Joseph, Mary and some animals, becomes clear in the light of Epiphany. (Epiphany, by the way, is just a Greek word which means appearance or manifestation.)

And so it is not an accident that we shine a spotlight on the church during these next seven and a half weeks. And one way we do that is at our Annual Church Meeting, which will be the last Sunday of this month, January 28th following the 11:00 service. Reports will be sent your way. You will hear what has been done in all of our names, and in the name of Jesus, in the community, close and world wide. And, of course, we will talk about where we think the parish has directed the building discernment committee and the vestry to go with possible plans. It will be at this meeting that we find out if we go for some kind of expansion or not. Needless to say, it will be an important one which will shape our future. (More information on the building issues will be forthcoming as will reports concerning the ministry of this parish.)

Once again, our collections at the crèche during Advent were very successful. You can see from the photos below that those coming to the four Advent services were very generous in their giving.

As a reminder, the stuffed animals went to the North Valley Hospital to be given to children coming into the emergency room. The food that was collected was delivered to the Columbia Falls food bank to be given to those less fortunate than we are. We collected over 1,300 pounds of pet food which went to the Flathead Valley Spay & Neuter Task Force to help those people who might not be able to afford food for their pets at this time of year...or any time, really. And the warm clothes that were collected the final Sunday were delivered to Samaritan House on Christmas morning to help the approximately 500 homeless people in and around our area.




CHRISTMAS OFFERINGS
