# WIRTH WATCHING – THE EARLY HISTORY OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTANA

On Sunday afternoon, October 8th, immediately following the 11:00 am service, Bradley's brother, Craig Wirth, the Director of Communications for the Diocese of Utah, will present a program covering the early history of the Diocese of Montana which, a century and a half ago, was 340,000 square miles of territory covering Montana, Idaho and Utah. He will also show a video he produced highlighting its pioneer clergy, Bishop Daniel Tuttle and Tuttle's companions, the Reverends Mr.



Foote and Mr. Goddard. As well, he is bringing some of Tuttle's possessions with him so it will be a fascinating hour. Craig is an Emmy Award winning journalist whose work has been on all the network morning shows. As well, he is a professor of communications at the University of Utah. A light meal will precede the presentation.

# A LETTER FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

This Sunday, October 1st, would have been my dad's 99th birthday. I hope next year my brothers and I, along with our families, can gather and toast the town in his memory. I remember as a very young curate at St. Mark's in Salt Lake City, one of our parishioners had a special service on the same anniversary of his father's birth and then a most festive dinner following. I filed that away thinking that one day I might do the same.

When I think of everything he knew, as he was a pretty bright man, the old song that was popularized by the movie, *Good Morning Vietnam*, in which Louis Armstrong crooned about seeing babies that would know more than he ever could know, also played true. Quite simply, I have a mind filled with a sense of newness, that he could have not imagined. Lots of things have been invented, as I mentioned a week ago in my sermon, that I got to experience as new compared to what my granddaughter, Emily, will appreciate as earthshaking. And similarly she will have things occurring in her later life that today is beyond my wildest imagination.

So newness comes about with new things on the horizon. But it can come to us in a much different way as well. We can learn something new by being in conversation. For example, every Wednesday, at the Springs for Bible study, we look at a piece of scripture (the \$26.78 word for that is a *pericope* of scripture) from our personal perspective. And without fail, every week, I walk away from our time together thinking, "I never thought of it that way before." It is stunning how life can be so enriched by simply being in conversation, especially with those who have a different understanding of life from what you happen to have.






# PREVIEW OF THE HISTORY OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTANA
