A LETTER FROM THE RECTOR


Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I think I once mentioned in a sermon that sometimes in the middle of the night I wake up in a panic about all the stuff that has to be done. A few nights ago that happened to me yet again, and I thought of the overwhelming amount of stuff coming our way: the building project; Lent; the Chili Open on March 9th (get your foursomes ready!); all the items demanding attention for the Standing Committee on which Cynthia and I serve; and I have to crank out a sermon for the ordination to the priesthood of Angelique Marie Bolling of Holy Trinity, Troy, on February 22nd. (The following day, Gretchen Strohmaier will be ordained a priest at Holy Spirit in Missoula. What a joy to see God's creativity and commissioning in action.)

And so, in the middle of the night, trying to come up with a connection between the 288th anniversary of Washington's birthday and ordination and not succeeding, I thankfully somehow remembered a phrase that my boss, Bill Maxwell, used when I was installed as the Rector of All Saints' Church, Salt Lake City, 26 years ago. In his sermon for the festivities he said, "Bradley, you don't buy a dog and then bark yourself. You let the dog bark. That, after all, is the dog's job." And I knew that not only did I have a great line for my sermon at Angel's ordination, but I had the spiritual melatonin to put me back to sleep for the night. (By the way, if you wonder why I'm retiring it may be said that I've finally run out of Bill's material for my sermons. Had it not been for him, instead of 39 years of active ministry, I'd probably would have only made a year and a half tops.)

Epiphany is a time in which we focus on God's appearing in our world through Jesus Christ. It was one thing for Jesus to be born into the world. It is another thing entirely that he was disclosed or made manifest as the Son of God, the Incarnate Christ. And one of the ways that disclosure still takes place, in a myriad of ways, is through the gifts of the spirit working in all of us, enabling us to engage in components of a ministry belonging to all of us, the Body of Christ. And so, in all the things we need to do this month and the next and which are overwhelming for one person, it is imperative that we realize they have never been designed for just one individual to accomplish. In order to do what is in front of us, some will engage in administration. Others will do the same with hospitality. I'll preach on Sundays. Carl will carve out the fairways in the snow for the Chili Open with his tractor. Shane will draw up the plans for the building expansion. And the dog will do what I have no talent, gift or business doing. The dog will make a joyful sound unto the Lord and bark mightily. In other words, yes we do have a lot going on but thankfully the Body of Christ is up to it because en masse, we've all been called to do what God has enabled us to do in spades, providing we do

STANDING COMMITTEE NEWS

On January 29th, the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Montana, functioning as the Ecclesiastical Authority of the diocese as we have no bishop, approved All Saints' Church obtaining a building loan and, if needed, longer term financing, in order to begin and bring to fruition the expansion of the sanctuary and the construction of two offices adjoining the Christian Education room. The Standing Committee approved as well the plan of the Vestry of All Saints' to name Bradley Rector Emeritus upon his retirement effective, most likely, July 31st of this year. This will allow him, following retirement, to be an assistant clergy person, to have a limited portfolio and to be useful in things the Vestry and/or interim rector and ultimately the new rector deem appropriate.



ASH WEDNESDAY SERVICES MARCH 6, 2019



On March 6, Lent will begin with Ash Wednesday.

This particular observation, in which a season is given over to self examination, prayer, and repentance, dates back to the Seventh Century. It originally began on a Sunday. Because there was a desire to make it forty week days for fasting (Sunday always is a feast day and the fast is broken.) four extra days were added a few centuries later and that was the advent of Ash Wednesday. On that day we will have three services, one at the Springs at 10:00 in Whitefish, another at All Saints' Church at Noon, and a third for children and youth at Cynthia Benkelman's house (contact Cynthia for information). All services will have the imposition of ashes, reminding us of our mortal nature, and the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, reminding us even more importantly of our companionship with one another and with God, through Christ, as well as our living in the midst of eternal life. You are invited to attend and begin your pilgrimage through Lent.



For the 6th year, All Saints' will once again participate in the world's most popular online Lenten devotion -


LENT MADNESS.

All Saints' 12th Annual Annual Chili Open Golf Tournament on Saturday, March 9, 2019.



For the twelfth year in a row, the most celebrated winter golf tournament in Montana will take place on the church grounds Saturday, March 9th 2019. Join us for this wonderful snow golf tournament that raises much needed funds for The Flathead County Animal Shelter, The Flathead Spay and Neuter Task Force, The Humane Society of Northwest Montana, and Spay Montana, serving the Blackfeet Reservation.

"Green Fees" which include golf and lunch are \$20 per person with the entirety of what is raised being donated to help the most vulnerable of God's creation, dogs and cats who are homeless and abused. A Friday night pre-tournament fund-raising party has a suggested donation of \$20. Again this year, holes in one can be purchased for \$50 each. (In the event of severely inclement weather, golfers will be notified that the event will be postponed to the following week.)

The Chili Open is a "shotgun started Texas Scramble" style tournament with a capacity of 72 golfers, 36 in the morning round and 36 in the afternoon round.

The first tee off time of the day is 10:30 a.m. and prior to that, rolls, pastries, and coffee will be available. At 12 noon a catered lunch will be served to all participants during which a silent auction will be held. Afternoon tee off time is 12:45.

On the night prior to the golf tournament, Friday, March 8th, beginning at 7:00, an evening wine/soft drink/appetizer fund-raising party will be held at the Pomerantz home at 342 Plantation Drive, north of Kalispell off Whitefish Stage Road. This fund-raising event has a suggested donation amount of \$20 with the entirety of that going to the dogs and cats.

Lunch is again being generously donated by Famous Dave's Restaurant in Kalispell, Loula's Restaurant in Whitefish, and Tupelo Grille in Whitefish.

In Search of Our New Bishop

The Episcopal Diocese of Montana

The Search Process in 2019

When Bishop Franklin Brookhart announced his retirement in 2017, he initiated the canonical process of selecting a new bishop. Guided by our diocesan procedures and those of the Episcopal Church, the **Standing Committee** set in motion the process recommended as most fair to all of us in the church and to any committed person willing to become the shepherd of the church in Montana:

A Consultant was selecting from among those recommended by the Presiding Bishop's office.

The Nominating Committee was formed by the selection of a lay person and a clergy person from each deanery. They designed and collated the surveys and they lead the listening sessions to develop the Diocesan Profile covering the gifts of our diocese — our people, our parishes, our history and our current needs

They coordinated the invitation to those interested to submit applications. Those have been screened and some interviews have been held. In early April the applicants chosen will share in a retreat together as they become more familiar with our diocese. Discernment is the core activity from this time forward and the Committee will prepare the slate of candidates to be approved by the Standing Committee. A short period is open for other applicants to petition for inclusion as candidates.

The Transition Committee helped coordinate the bishop's retirement at the last Diocesan Convention, and now is working to plan and to coordinate the more public events of this search process. Public Walkabouts to introduce the candidates to the people of the diocese will be held at five locations throughout the diocese in early July. With some time to assess and discern the talents and gifts of the candidates, and relying on the Holy Spirit, the Special Election Convention will be held at the end of July in Bozeman to choose our new bishop. The Diocesan Convention begins there the next day. The other bishops of the Episcopal Church and the Standing Committees of each diocese will proffer their consent and acceptance of the bishop-elect for our local church.

In early December, our **Presiding Bishop Michael Curry will ordain our new bishop** in Helena. The next day our bishop will be seated in the bishop's chair of our St Peter's Cathedral.

This search for a new bishop is a unique opportunity for the people of our diocese.

Please join us with prayer and hope in this adventure.

We must choose someone who has been with us the whole time that the Lord Jesus was travelling round with us, someone who was with us right from the time when John was baptizing until the day when he was taken up from us – and he can act with us as a witness to his resurrection.' Having nominated two candidates, Joseph known as Barsabbas... and Matthias, they prayed, 'Lord, you can read everyone's heart; show us therefore which of these two you have chosen to take over this ministry and apostolate, which Judas abandoned to go to his proper place'.

They then drew lots for them, and as the lot fell to Matthias, he was listed as one of the twelve apostles. Acts 1:21-26

A Letter from The Standing Committee of the Diocese of Montana serving as the Ecclesiastical Authority on the Suspension of the Statute of Limitations for Clergy Sexual Misconduct.

Dear friends in Christ in the Diocese of Montana,

At the General Convention of the Episcopal Church this past July, a resolution was approved to suspend for three years the canon (church law) that places a time limit on initiating proceedings in cases of clergy misconduct against adults. There is no time limit on reporting clergy sexual misconduct against children and youth.

As a result of this resolution, from January 1, 2019 until December 31, 2021, those who wish to bring a case of sexual misconduct against a member of the clergy will be able to do so, regardless of how long ago, the alleged misconduct occurred.

Allegations of misconduct in this diocese may be made to our intake officer, The Rev. Jean Collins. Her email is jgcollins08@gmail.com. Reports may also be made to our confidential hotline at either 800-495-2159 or 406-442-4175.

The Church is the Body of Christ; called at all times to be a living example of the human expression of God found in the person of Jesus. Called to be the place where all of our members are loved and cared for, nurtured and respect, and never, ever harmed or abused in any way. Your Standing Committee is deeply committed to helping all of our churches be places of safety, welcome, and love. Please know that any allegations of sexual misconduct by clergy, or anyone in a position of authority, including laity, will be treated with great seriousness and no one who is in leadership in our church will be protected from the full enforcement of the law. If you find you need to talk with any of us about issues of sexual misconduct in the church, please feel free to contact us at any time. All Standing Committee


