#### Advent Offerings brought to the Crèche

As is our tradition at All Saints', we'll bring gifts to the crèche for the most vulnerable in our community during the four Sundays of Advent.

First Sunday of Advent, November 28 - Teddy Bears

You are invited to bring teddy bears and other NEW stuffed animals, less than 12" tall, which will then be given to North Valley Hospital. Every year North Valley Hospital gave

away thousands of stuffed animals to their young pediatric patients who came to the emergency room. Often that can be a frightening experience and a soft stuffed toy can go a long way to provide comfort.

#### Second Sunday of Advent, December 5 - Food for Food Pantries



We collect non-perishable food for local food banks as the offering for this day. A concerted effort to help well stock these vital ministries in our valley is important when the need is so great.

#### Third Sunday of Advent, December 12 - Pet Food



On this day we will collect dog and cat food in an effort to


provide food for the pets of people having difficulty making ends meet. The food you donate will be transported to the Flathead Valley Spay and Neuter Task Force for distribution to those who can use such help.

#### Fourth Sunday of Advent, December 19 - <u>NEW</u> Warm Clothing



For the last Sunday of Advent our focus is on warm clothing for the Warming Center, a low barrier shelter which provides a warm and safe place for unhoused individuals during the coldest months of the year. The Warming Center opened its permanent home in October of 2020 and completed some major renovations this year including showers, laundry, and lockers.

## FROM THE RECTOR

Very rarely, does the Gospel of John get read at Christmas services in the Episcopal Church. John 1 is a big text. It's cosmic in scale, and theologically dense. And folks in the pews would rather hear about shepherds abiding in their fields and angels singing their glorias, and understandably so. I love that side of the story too.

But in John's prologue, we learn when, where, what, and who the Word was. My high school journalism teacher would be so proud! The structure of these first two verses of John are what are known as a *chiasmus*. In a chiasmus, the second half of a parallel sentence reverses itself. You can chart it with a big ol' "X".

"In the beginning was the Word, and the word was with God,"

"And the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God."

A chiasmus gets its name from the Greek letter "*chi*", which looks like an X. *Chi* became a popular symbol for early Christians since *chi* and *rho* (shaped like a p), were shorthand for Jesus' name: *Christos*.

Some medieval monks with tons of talent (and even more time) would painstakingly draw and embellish this symbol as they hand-copied the scriptures. The Book of Kells, on display at Trinity College Dublin, has a stunning example of a Chi-Rho. Give it a Google: "Chi-Rho Kells"!

At the basic structural level of these verses, symbols, and words, we see God cry out the truth of the Son. The Word became the name of a man: Jesus, "God saves". Words are very important in our tradition, and we're told that God created worlds with words. But while words are important, they alone cannot save us. No matter what stories we tell or what songs we sing on any given Sunday, there is only one power in the universe that brings us back to the beginning. And in the end, the *chi* becomes a cross from which Christ breathed out his last earthly words for our salvation.

The Gospel from the first week of Advent instructs us to be aware and to look for the signs of things that are coming to fruition. And by this Jesus means not just the end of things, and not just the joy of God coming to us as one of us, but our own salvation. He says, "raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near."

This Advent season, I pray that God will afford us all the space to contemplate these holy mysteries, not simply in the letters on the page, but in the litter and letter of our day-to-day lives. May your Adventide be luminous and purposeful.

To alpha, omega, and back again.

## **CHILDREN'S CHRISTMAS PAGEANT**

Christmas Pageant planning is underway!

We always do a short, fun musical, and perform at the 4:00 PM Christmas Eve Service. This year we will have a play that will be easy to learn, with letters and scrolls that characters will read, so no memorizing. There are some original songs, and a couple of familiar Christmas carols. It usually lasts 15-20 minutes.

If you have not already done so, please let me know if you have a kid interested in participating in the pageant. I need to know what size part they would like (reading a longer part? reading one or two lines? no lines?) and/or if they would like to sing a solo? There are songs for the whole group and songs that have parts where individuals can sing a verse.

All kids are invited and encouraged to join us, from toddlers to high school students. This year's play is "Christmas Letters," which involves kids reading a letter to a person in the Christmas story, and then that biblical character answers their letter by reading from a "scroll". Costumes will be pretty minimal, with kids wearing "Christmas outfits" and biblical characters will have a robe to indicate their part. For the littlest actors, we'll have fun things for them to wear if they choose, like angel halos, star wands, or even animal hats.

We have three practices. It's really helpful if your child can go to all of them, but if they cannot, let me know and we will work around your schedule.

Practice will be:

**Sunday Dec. 12, 12:30 - 2:00 PM** We will learn some of the music that the kids will sing together. We'll read through the play so that each character can see how their part fits in. Any soloists will be able to work with our accompanist, Jenanne Solberg towards the end of rehearsal if they wish. We've found that the littlest kids get restless and a little bored (and we certainly understand!) so I try to have their participation at the beginning, and parents can take them home afterwards if they don't want to stick around for the whole rehearsal.

**Sunday Dec. 19, 12:30 - 1:30 PM** Jenanne will only have a short time this Sunday because of a symphony performance, so this rehearsal will be a little shorter also. We'll go through the play once, with group songs, and then any soloists can spend a few minutes with Jenanne to practice their parts.

**Tuesday Dec 21, 1:00 PM - 2:30 PM** This is the Dress Rehearsal! We'll go through the play several times, with music, and distribute any costumes.

Friday December 24, 3:15 PM Meet in the parish hall, to get ready to go over to the service!

This is so much fun every year, and we're excited to be able to do this, especially since we have a new space and larger church now! Kids can do as much or as little as they like. Please let me know as soon as possible, how your child would like to participate.

# NATE CHUTE FOUNDATION

It is a Christmas tradition at All Saints' Church to give away to the community, the loose offerings of currency and checks designated as "Christmas Community Offering" we receive from the 4 Christmas services. This year our Christmas offerings will go to the <u>Nate</u> <u>Chute Foundation</u>, a nonprofit dedicated to reducing suicide in western Montana through education, outreach, and training. NCF offers evidence-based training and education to area schools and organizations to help identify suicidal behavior and build resiliency. They



also provide financial assistance for professional counseling to those at risk of suicide. For all age groups, Montana has ranked in the top five for suicide rates in the nation, for the past thirty years. The NCF has been working vigilantly the last few months with area schools as they seek to address the rash of teenage suicides seen in Flathead County high schools. As we celebrate Christ's coming among us as one of us, this seems like a particularly timely way to express love for God and for our neighbors.

# **ABBIE SHELTER**

Covid has obviously affected the lives of not only individuals, but also some of the organizations All Saints' has supported over the years. The vestry started a Covid relief fund last year and has given away money to help individuals and families impacted by Covid, but we have not forgotten one of the organizations we have partnered with for many years, the Abbie Shelter. The Abbie Shelter is a remarkable agency which directly serves victims and survivors of domestic violence. Although "Shelter" is part of their name, they are much more than just that. They also provide court advocacy and can help with Or-

ders of Protection; they offer counseling which can treat all mental health needs and have specialized training in domestic violence and sexual assault; they staff a 24 hour helpline providing a nonjudgmental listening ear and the gateway to their other services. They are there to support victims of violence through the process of getting safe. This Christmas, All Saints' Covid Relief Fund will be sending a donation to the Abbie Shelter to support their mission.






# ALL SAINTS' YOUTH
